

1. The <u>allure</u> of idols.

- a. Idols promise to let us be <u>in control</u>.
- b. Idols promise to give us something we want.

2. The grip of idols.

- a. We fall <u>blindly</u> in <u>love</u> with our idols.
- b. They become core to our <u>identity</u>.

3. The <u>deadliness</u> of idols.

- a. Idols create irrational <u>fear</u> and <u>confusion</u>.
- b. Idols will <u>overpower</u> and <u>master</u> you.
- c. Idols will <u>humiliate</u> and <u>ruin</u> you.

4. The <u>alternative</u> to idols.

- a. You can have a relationship with the great King.
- b. This relationship is not based on what <u>you</u> can do for God, but on what <u>He</u> already did for you.



Application Questions: The Danger of Idolatry

- 1. What's one thing you did to promote or participate in a Gospel partnership this week?
- 2. What are some of the popular idols of our culture (things people look to, other than God, for their ultimate sense of purpose, significance, security, or identity)?
- 3. Maybe you can only answer this question privately right now, but what are some of your idols?
- 4. What do you gain by keeping the answers to #3 to yourself? What do you lose? What are some potential dangers of keeping this information *too* private?
- 5. Select the most prominent idol from your list in #3:
 - What kinds of promises does that thing seem to make to you?
 - What do you want, deep down, that you think that thing will provide?
 - How do you feel when that thing seems to be working?
 - How do you feel when that thing seems to be failing you?
 - Consider the power paradox concerning that idol: a) How does that thing have no actual power in and of itself? b) How does that thing, nonetheless, exercise immense power in your life?
 - How have you seen others disgraced and ruined by a similar idol?
- 6. What does God offer you in place of what that idol promises?
- 7. What one thing will you do this week to repudiate that idol? How will others recognize that you've done this?
