## **Gospel Applications: Servant Leaders**

The Bible calls a spiritual leader in the church a *shepherd* (pastor), an *elder*, and an *overseer*. Reference those three titles/roles for the next few questions:

- 1. Which of these titles makes the most sense to (or resonates the most with) you and why? Which seems the most obsolete and why?
- 2. What does each title communicate to you about the role of those who lead the church? Why are all three important?
- 3. What does each title imply about what it means to follow these leaders?
- 4. How does the modern American church view the role and responsibilities of a pastor differently than what's implied in the biblical role? What do you think people are most looking for in a pastor today?
- 5. How do you want a pastor to act toward . . .
  - a lost sheep who's wandered off into a pattern of sin?
  - a hireling who's just in it for a paycheck?
  - a wolf who attacks and divides the flock with gossip and slander?
- 6. Biblically, how is a true shepherd required to act toward the three types of people in #5? What do you make of a shepherd who's unwilling to guard and protect the flock by sacrificing his own reputation and wellbeing?
- 7. What are some practical, healthy ways to show the right kind of honor and submission to spiritual leaders?
- 8. When you think about Jesus Christ as the Chief Good Shepherd, how does that humble you? How does that lift you up?
- 9. What's one specific way you plan to respond to this message?
