Gospel Applications: Stay in The Story

- 1. What is your all-time favorite book or story outside the Bible? Think about the protagonist(s) and some of the challenges he/she/they had to face. What would the story be like without those challenges and tension?
- 2. What stood out to you the most this time through the Joseph story?
- 3. Put yourself in Joseph's shoes. What do you think the most anxious, frustrating, stressful moment or season would've been for you? Why?
- 4. What are some practical ways it helps you to remember that *everyone's* story includes both good <u>and</u> bad, joy <u>and</u> sorrow, successes <u>and</u> failures?
- 5. Why do you think the author repeatedly makes the point that the Lord was with Joseph when bad things were happening to him?
- 6. What are some times when you've questioned, "Where are you, God?" In those times, why did you think he was afar off? What were your underlying assumptions behind those thoughts?
- 7. What are the top 2-3 things you think your story is saying about God right now? What are you intentionally doing/saying to proclaim the truth about God? Are there any parts of your life (actions, words, reactions, attitudes, treasures, etc.) that are functionally telling a lie about God?
- 8. What are some of the God-given purposes of your life, according to the Bible? How is God still accomplishing that grand design even when/if he's not fulfilling your personal hopes, dreams, and plans?
- 9. How does the Gospel redeem your story, especially the dark and broken parts? How does the hope of eternal life with Jesus fundamentally change your story?
- 10. What one thing will you do with this message this week?
